






There is Persistent and Significant Racial Disparity on EVERY SINGLE Quality of Life Domain







# Drivers Housing Cost Burden

Housing costs rising disproportionately to household incomes, a particular problem for lower-income households in cities with an inadequate supply of social or public housing. In San Francisco, the poorest 5% earn approximately \$650 per month, while the bottom 5% of rental rates are around \$1,500 per month (Fidler & Sabir, 2019).

Affordable housing supply is not meeting demand, with limited incentives for the private sector to develop affordable housing. Scarcity of land for affordable housing, often due to a lack of alignment among city, state and federal agencies on how land is to be valued and taxed.








### **Rise in Displacement Globally**
